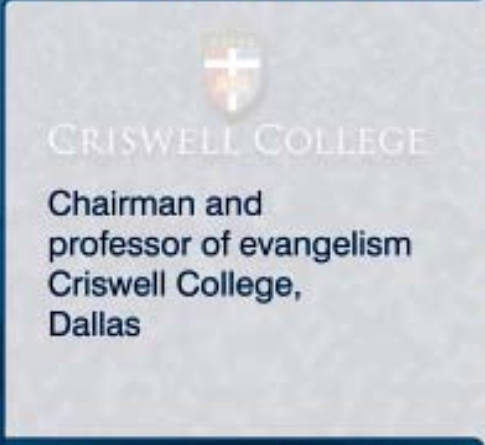

### Giving Patterns in WV

*Since your final 2004 mission gifts may not have arrived here until the first week of 2005, and since your final 2005 check may not have reached Scott Depot by the December 30 cutoff, your treasurer's reported total gifts may not agree with the figures you see printed on pages 5-8. If you are unable to figure out why certain differences exist between these printed reports and your church treasurer's reports, please call Kay Boyd or Linda Gillispie at 1.800.411.5758 to seek clarification or to identify any errors.*

This edition includes four pages of financial reports that list total 2005 mission gifts received in the Scott Depot offices of the WVCSB by December 30. The reports reflect gifts to missions beyond local church fields.

While financial gifts do not show the total picture of any church's world missions ministry, they are significant measures of Christian stewardship. Expenditures of time and money to local missions are not shown in the financial reports in this edition. Annual Church Profiles and interviews with locals leaders could fill in additional parts of a local church's missions ministry story.

Since factors like those mentioned in paragraph one contribute to the exactness of published annual figures, comparisons with a previous year are not perfect. However, they can be accurate and informative. With those assumptions in mind, this article will try to provide some analysis of WV giving patterns.

Total gifts to all categories of missions increased \$37,463 in 2005. How do we feel about that?

On one hand, we feel gratitude for increased giving. On the other hand, the figure represents an increase of only \$1.50 per year per resident member (or three cents per week) that left the local church field and made its way onto the mission field. The Cooperative Program, Annie Armstrong, Lottie Moon, Ola Cox and World Hunger figures are all included in that \$1.50 per member per year increase.

Gifts channeled to world missions through the Cooperative Program category increased \$37,510. Since the increase to the CP is greater than the increase for all missions categories combined, the reader has likely concluded that special offerings were down in 2005. In fact, some were and some were not.

The special offering for North American missions was down \$5,521. Special gifts for international missions were up by \$21,146.

Gifts to WV missions via the Ola Cox offering were down \$9,715. Gifts for World Hunger were down \$5,957. The result was a \$47 decrease in 2005 giving to all special offerings.

The picture takes on additional dimensions when inflation is considered. Annual inflation was somewhere between 2 and 3 percent in 2005. That means it took approximately 2-3% more to buy the same goods and services in 2005 as you purchased in 2004.

To stay even with the missions buying power of 2004, our 2005 giving needed to increase \$32,105 (2%) to \$48,158 (3%). Our actual increase, \$37,463 represents slightly more than the 2% figure. We did not increase the buying power of our missions gifts. We didn't quite maintain the status quo.

Few who live in West Virginia live under the misguided notion that our state or our churches serve in a healthy economy. It has been tough to make a living here for a long time. The future appears to be much the same.

For those who are missions minded, the important question may be, "What can we do to improve the funding picture for our churches and thus our world missions efforts?"

One thing is certain, to honor God we need to give generously to meet the needs of our local congregation. This assures that the pressing needs of our Jerusalem can be addressed with compassion and funds.

If we are not giving 10% of our income as an undesignated gift through our local church offering, we need to grow in our giving. We need to reach the 10% figure as quickly as possible. Nor should we cap our giving at the 10% level. We should give beyond that percent as God prospers us.

If we give generously, is it not also logical that we should ask our congregation to set aside generous portions of its gifts to missions beyond the local church? Why not seek to grow in this area as well?

If our church gave 10% to world missions via the Cooperative Program channel last year, why not seek to give a greater percentage this year? If we have been giving less than 10%, will we begin increasing our church's giving level by a quarter to a half percent per year?

It doesn't take a huge effort on the part of anyone if everyone shares in the responsibility of giving for missions. Note the following to illustrate this point.

The reported resident membership of WV Southern Baptist Churches as of the Novem-



ber annual meeting was 22,127. Keep in mind that 38 churches had not reported by that time so the figure above could easily top 25 thousand resident members if all statistical reports were included.

Note that the 2005 total gifts from WV churches for all categories of non-local missions was \$1,642,718. Divided equally between the estimated 25,000 resident members in WV, \$65.71 per person per year is making its way outside the local church to state, national, and international missions efforts. That is \$1.26 per person per week, or 18 cents per day.

Another way to look at it is to think of what our portion of the weekly missions giving beyond our local church would have bought us if we had kept it for ourselves. The per person, per week amount leaving our local church field was roughly the cost of a cup of coffee at the local Bob Evans restaurant.

We may want to rethink the amount of our gifts to our local church, the percentages staying in our local missions budget, and the percentages we strive to send beyond our local needs to fund worldwide efforts to spread the Gospel. We can probably do a lot more for God's Kingdom than we currently are.

Should we? Can we? Will we?

God help us to do the best we can with whatever resources he places in our hands. We should all remember that a few loaves and fishes in the hands of Jesus can feed the world!

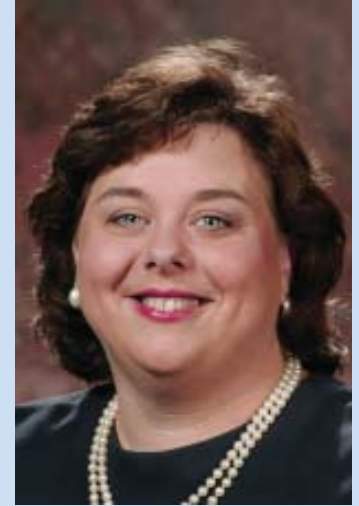
